
Spanish: A World Power Language

With more than 490 million speakers, Spanish is the world's third most spoken language. In the Americas, it is the dominant language, spoken by 51 out of every 100 people. The United States, with more than 53 million Spanish speakers, currently ranks second among the Spanish-speaking countries of the world. By the year 2050, the projected Hispanic population of the United States will reach 28%.
